- Solve common problems in rehearsal, including uneven rhythm, rushing and dragging, ragged ensemble
- Study a score, including how to identify musical problems and develop solutions

Tempo, Rhythm and Responsibility

MORNING SESSION

Conducting: Review basic right and left hand gestures. Strengthen baton, hand, arm, and body movements to communicate rhythm and tempo in a way that gets results.

Communication: WPMTM approaches that compel students' concentration, inspire active involvement throughout the rehearsal, and get things back on track if/when needed.

Score Study/Rehearsing: WPM[™] approaches that create tangible progress that carries over to the next rehearsal; Access Point[™] approach to identifying passages that are key to learning entire works, and

spotting problems likely to happen in rehearsal; how to fix most common problems quickly, such as rushing/dragging, ragged rhythm, not listening, etc.
